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
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
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
Are we teaching critical information literacy asynchronously? A content analysis of digital learning objects in open repositories

The answer is yes! But we could be doing more. Digital learning objects (DLOs) have the potential to go beyond what you might cover in a one-shot session and reach a broad audience. Librarians interested in incorporating critical information literacy (CIL) concepts into their online instruction can look to examples already available in open repositories and think about ways to resist dominant narratives in how we find, use, and evaluate information while empowering learners to enact social change. This poster presents a network graph created by identifying the top three concepts covered in 105 DLOs and shows concepts commonly taught together, including topics associated with CIL. DLOs are asynchronous, learner-centered materials that use digital text, images, and/or videos to convey concepts, including:

- Tutorials
- Videos
- Modules
- Infographics
